Barnum House Museum, located west of Grafton on County Road 2, closes for the season August 31.

Thanks to student staffers, the museum has been open this summer on a Wednesday-through-Sunday basis, following the summer of 2002 when it did not open on a regular basis.

That summer, according to board member Greg Hancock — as quoted in a story in the Cobourg Daily Star — grants had not been available to hire student docents, as was the customary practice.

This year, a portion of the funding to hire the three university students came from a private donation. As well, the Ontario Heritage Foundation was able to secure a student-wage subsidy from Sir Sandford Fleming College.

Built by Eliakim Barnum between 1817 and 1820, the grand residence was home to the Barnum family for a century. It passed to the Prentice family in 1917. It was bought and restored in 1939 as a house museum by the Architectural Conservancy of Ontario.

It was operated as a museum by the Township of Haldimand from 1958 to 1989, though the Ontario Heritage Foundation had acquired ownership in 1982. In 1989, they entered into a partnership with the County of Northumberland for the museum's development.




Eliakim Barnum arrived in Upper Canada early in the 1800s from Vermont. From these origins, he became a prosperous and influential businessman, whose house is now one of the more outstanding examples of early 19th-century Ontario domestic architecture - specifically, the Neo-Classical style in timber frame and wood detailing.

The summer staffers welcomed visitors from as far away as British Columbia, Texas and Germany. Kathy Dickson of the Ontario Heritage Federation says statistics are being gathered on attendance over this summer, and they will be reviewed over the coming weeks.

Meanwhile, you can still view this heritage home daily from noon to 4 p.m. until Sunday.
