## Planner can't serve two municipalities

Choose one municipality or the other, contracted municipal planner Peter Josephs has been instructed by Alnwick-Haldimand Township council.

"If Cramahe Township takes us to the Ontario Municipal Board (OMB), then who are you representing?" Alnwick-Haldimand Deputy Mayor Rosemarie Robins asked Mr. Josephs last week.

As planner for Alnwick-Haldimand Township, Mr. Josephs has been advising and co-ordinating the paperwork and public consultation process required for a rezoning application of Shelter Valley Aggregates. Shelter Valley proposes to establish a 140-acre gravel northeast of Vernonville between Shelter Valley and Turk Road. Mr. Josephs is also the contracted planner for Cramahe Township. Cramahe Township has registered concerns about potential volumes of truck traffic which will travel from the proposed pit site into Cramahe Township.

"We have heard they (Cramahe Township council) have laid out their objections and they may feel strongly enough to take it to the OMB," Mrs. Robins said.

Mr. Josephs seemed stunned by the question, and then responded, "I hadn't actually thought about it. I honestly didn't think it would be necessary."

In the brief silence that followed with council members, press and 25 or so people in attendance looking on, Mr. Josephs said, "I would be working for this township."

He said he would inform Cramahe Township of the development.

Township Mayor Jim Williams said Cramahe Township has concerns about traffic impacts from both the proposed CJC water bottling plant and the gravel pit in neighbouring Alnwick/Haldimand Township. Both projects indicate truck traffic from the proposed industrial sites using County Road 25 and secondary Cramahe Township roads as arterial access.

However, Mr. Williams said, it is not Cramahe's intention to be adversarial in its dealings with Alnwick-Haldimand Township.

The next regular meeting of Cramahe Township council is not until September 2, Mr. Williams observed, so the Cramahe council hasn't had the opportunity to discuss new developments.

Mr. Josephs was attending council to recommend two professional agencies to conduct peer reviews of the scientific and technical support studies included, as mandated, is the Shelter valley Aggregates application for a gravel pit licence. He proposed Trew Associates, Consulting Engineers, to review the groundwater, surface water, aggregate reports and noise review studies prepared by professionals on behalf of Shelter Valley Aggregates. Niblett Environmental Associates Inc. is proposed for the natural science studies review.

In a letter to council, Valley Voices has requested involvement in the peer review process and in establishing the parameters for a traffic impact study.


