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Cramahe Township high school student, Kate Oakley is the third best junior javelin thrower in the province. She proved it at Etobicoke Centennial Park at the OFSAA Track and Field Championships which were held there on June 2-4.

This was Kate's second trip to OFSAA as a member of the ENSS track and field team. Last year she was eighth in the province.

At this year's event she threw four metres further than last year and missed the silver by half a metre.

Her 35.6 metre throw was six metres short of the winner. That doesn't seem to phase the diminutive thrower. She's aiming for the top next year. And there's no reason to believe she can't do it.

She took third with very little weight training, relying instead on technique and a naturally strong upper body. And next year she hopes to be injury-free. Last time around she lost some practice time due to subluxing in her shoulder caused by an injury in volleyball.

Kate isn't a one sport wonder.

In track this year she entered three throwing events, and went to OFSAA in two. Discuss is the only event where she failed to qualify.

Last winter she could have gone to OFSAA as a Wrestler in the 64 kg class, but got sick. At 5'5", she's a good height for wrestling, able to use her strength to lever other girls to the mat.

Two years ago in grade eight, she turned a lot of heads, playing tackle football in the Belleville Minor Football League.

She impressed the Commissioner so

much that she won the award for leadership, initiative and sportsmanship.

In softball, basketball and rugby it's much the same, playing the game with an edge. Kate admits she doesn't like to lose; she's very competitive.

She played goal in ball hockey last winter and came home after every game bruised because her pads were too tight but she loved it and would like to do it on the ice. the ice.
