Reading together is the perfect way to create won-derful family memories, and to revisit a few of the classics you enjoyed as a child.

Recently, we invited Jeni Dyment, children's librarian at the Brighton Public Library to share with us her top 10 list for country-inspired reads for children.

Jeni's top picks provide a starting point for some quality family reading time. Her choices include:

Daddy Played Music for the Cows by Maryann Weidt (for readers aged four to eight) - A bit of a nostalgic read, this book depicts the early years of a little girl growing up on a dairy farm.

A Prairie Alphabet by Jo Bannatyne-Cuget (for readers aged four to eight) – Impressive art work brings the Canadian prairies to life.

It's a Perfect Day by Abigail Pizer (for readers aged two to five) – The author takes readers on a journey in the life of a menagerie of countryside animals.

Farmer Duck by Martin Waddell and Helen Oxenbury (for readers aged three and up) – This fun tale relates the adventures of a duck that runs a farm single-handedly (er, footedly).

Misty's Twilight by Marguerite Henry (for readers aged nine to 12) - Twilight is the great, greatgranddaughter of the famous pinto, Misty of Chincoteague. Sired by a thoroughbred, the pony discovers the popular equestrian sports of cutting, jumping and dressage.

Mystery on the Farm by Mary Crockett (for newly independent readers) – In this book readers meet Jamie who lives on a remote farm where he and a friend have many adventures.

Farm by Ned Halley (for readers aged nine to 12) – In this Eyewitness Book, readers discover the story of farming, including the rhythm of the seasons, the rearing of livestock, and the work of plowing, sowing and harvesting.

The Day Jimmy's Boa Ate the Wash by Trinka Hakes Noble (for readers aged eight to 10) - A class trip to the farm is dull until the cow starts crying, the haystack falls and the pigs get loose. What about the boa? It's a looooong story. Check it out.


So why not pack up the kids and make the short trip to your local library today? You'll be amazed at the family memories that await you there.




