. Wain's Greenhouses will provide the hanging baskets that will brighten Colborne's downtown next summer.

Jackie Baker Smith, Cramahe Township's gardener, was on hand at Cramahe Township Council on February 1 to answer Council's questions regarding the two tenders she received for the 46 baskets.

After stating his satisfaction with the process, Councillor Ed Van Egmond expressed his unhappiness that the work was going outside the Township when the work could be

mums to tulips with the two tenders which were significantly different in cost.

The Wain price was \$2,168 and the second tender from Gerry Jackson, a Cramahe Township farmer and greenhouse operator was for \$2,909. Both prices included taxes.

Councillor Van Egmond was assured that both quotes were for identical baskets. She later stated that each 16 inch basket will hold eight ivy geraniums, two yellow biddens, one helichrysum vine, two scaveola and a celebration petunia.

Ms. Baker Smith offered to Council that the Wains give her lots of free materials and run a

much bigger operation, suggesting that might be why they were able to offer a much lower price. At the same time she expressed her support for Mr. Jackson and his product.

Councillor Marc Coombs suggested a frame of reference that was used for this tender and a tender for a Township fire van. He considered a five per cent difference as reasonable. If the local bid is within five per cent of the lowest, then it is given consideration.

That was not the case for the hanging baskets and the Wain bid was accepted.

Ms. Baker Smith noted in her discussion with Council that she had tried in previous years to get quotes from other Cramahe Township growers without success.
