Council/builders air Colborne Creek concerns

Most of those present at the joint meeting of Cramahe council and the builders of Colborne Creek seemed satisfied at the end of their meeting following December 6.

The meeting came arose from a November 15 request of Deputy Mayor Ray Kelly.

Speaking in November about the development which the township owns, Mr. Kelly expressed his "great concern" regarding the cost to the township taxpayers. At the time, he stated a need to reduce the burden. The deputy mayor worried that only five houses had been sold on the 80 vacant lots.

He also brought forward his concern, expressed again at the joint meeting on December 6 about paying real estate fees. On November 15, he asserted, I've driven through the park and wouldn't mind building, but I'll be damned if I should pay an extra \$5-6 thousand (in real estate fees) if I know the builder I want to use."

Director of Development, Becky Bonisteel noted at the time there were five homes built and four sold. The agreement between the builders and the township was that 10 homes would be sold in the first year. The year started when the roads went in last August. She added, Steve Bowskill, who financed the building of two models had expressed an interest in building two more.

Her statement was reinforced by builder John Kernaghan on December 6 when he announced he was prepared to build two new models in the spring.

To emphasize the increase in recent growth in Colborne, Mrs. Bonisteel compared 1997-2003 when 17 homes were built, to 2004-5 when 30 homes were constructed in the former village of Colborne.

Perhaps to measure the progress of the Colborne Creek development, Mrs. Bonisteel stated Mike Voskamp's Jane's Court took two years for 16 homes to sell.
