Retired teacher, Claude Thompson, chairman of the reunion, was surprised to be reminded that in the list of staff in 1980, both he and the present principal, Truelove, were on the list. Truelove had taught at ENSS for a time before moving to various other schools in his career, finally returning to ENSS

as principal.

Cheer was excited at the quantity of material inside for her memorabilia room, but was also wondering if she had enough space to properly display the contents.

The box opening was a sort of official start to the weekend reunion, with registration starting in the same room later in the day.

A highly satisfied chairman of the event, retired educator Claude Thompson, chimed Monday, "We had a great weekend. All the events were well attended and supported."

He commented that organizers had expected "about 100" for the closing brunch event on Sunday, but almost 250 turned up."

He said that kind of support was typical of all the events held over the busy weekend.

The 50th reunion drew some 500 registrations from as far as Europe, Hong Kong and Australia, as well as across North America.
