2006 census report

4.1% population growth here

There's been an official 4.1 per cent population increase in Cramahe Township population in the past five years. Official data from Statistics Canada, comparing census figures from 2006 and 2001, were released Tuesday.

In 2001, Cramahe's population was listed as 5,713.

Last year, it increased to 5,950.

Just 50 people short of a 6,000 population benchmark, the municipality's 2006 census results show there are 2,548 private dwellings. The municipality has a population density of 29.5 people per square kilometre. The township in its entirety is 201.56 square kilometres.

Northumberland County, with seven member municipalities (including Cramahe Township), saw a population increase from 77,497 in 2001 to 80,963 in 2006, a 4.5 per cent growth rate. Compare that with the provincial average of 6.6 per cent population

growth.

Across Northumberland, as of 2006, there are 35,069 dwelling across 1,903 square kilometres giving an average county-wide population density of 42.5 people per square kilometre.

The 2006 population for the province is given as

12,160,282, up from 11m410,046 in 2001.
