## Parking changes set for Cramahé

Parking will be prohibited on both sides of Division St. from King to Earl due to an increased flow of traffic, and Percy St. from Church to Kelwood Lane is also being hit with parking disallowed on both sides.

"I have added no parking on both sides of King Street East from Kensington to Colton Street to accommodate bicycle lanes," Mr. Harris said.

Parking on highways is now restricted to no more than three hours as Mr. Harris said he has received many complaints of vehicles parking for long periods of time on township roads.

He has also added a new offence of unlawfully park on private property.

"This offence covers a circumstance where a property owner has a complaint about a vehicle unlawfully parking on their property," Mr. Harris explained "This is only acted

upon when a written complaint is received from the property owner, signs are clearly posted, and a waiver is signed."

Heavy trucks will also be prohibited from Robertson St. and Norton Lane, should council enact the updated bylaw.

Members of the public complained there isn't any available parking at Percy Manor or at the United Church at the corner of Percy and Church Streets. If street parking is prohibited, people will have no place to park, it was noted. Mr. Harris said allowing parking on either side of Percy St. is dangerous. Church parking on the streets will likely be allowed.

"I don't think I'll be out ticketing church-going people on a Sunday," Mr. Harris said.

Mayor Marc Coombs said he would like to take a look at the areas affected by these proposed changes and discuss them at the Apr. 17 council meeting.
