Task force looking to save Warkworth Penitentiary

living in the surrounding communities are employed there, said Northumberland County Warden Christine Herrington, who chairs the committee. "These communities include Quinte West, Belleville, Hastings and Peterborough."

She says closure of the institution would not only impact these 380 people and their

families but the enormous spin-off effect of local businesses that provide goods and services to the institution would also be affected.

Ms. Herrington and Brighton council suggested forming the task force in July after being informed of a Correction "According to employment data, 170 Services Canada report recommending County residents work at Warkworth possible closure of the Warkworth Institution, and another 210 individuals Penitentiary and a new regional complex being built near Kingston.

Warkworth's facility is one of the largest of its kind in the country that employs almost 400 people and its loss would be significant in a community that has seen significant job losses in the past few years, she says.
