## Accident victim a true family man

John Atkinson died in motorcycle accident June 25

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NORTHUMBERLAND - John Atkinson would drop anything for the chance to visit his eight-month-old granddaughter Nikka.

He would jump on his beloved 2008 Suzuki motorcycle and ride to the chip truck where he and his daughter, Erin Kaufman, would play with the little girl.

His family meant the world to him. Nothing could come between them, says his daughter. The two talked every day.

The 54-year-old Bailieboro man was killed Wednesday, June 25, after his motorcycle struck a car on County Road 25, east of Castleton. Ms. Kaufman was the last person to speak with him before the accident. She had called him on his cellphone. As usual, she said, "I love you."

Northumberland OPP said the accident, which happened around 6:45 a.m., occurred after a 72-year-old Colborne man pulled his Volkswagen Jetta out of a driveway and into Mr. Atkinson's path.

While news of the accident has left the family devastated, Ms Kaufman says she doesn't

regret him buying that bike.

"His motorcycle was his break. He just finished his motorcycle course. He loved the darn bike."

Mr. Atkinson was the father of three children – Erin, Jaclyn and Jayson. His daughter Jaclyn has lived in Korea for the past six years. She is heading home to be with family, Ms. Kaufman says.

She takes a moment to reflect on her father, a man who she says was well liked within the community.

"He was very honoured and respected. He was a gentleman. He was a really great guy."
A farmer at heart, Mr. Atkinson lived in Bai-

lieboro for the past 16
years. He used to raise
sheep and hogs but currently farmed beef cat-

He also ran Atkinson Farming, Custom Services and Tree Removal, a business that kept him busy on weekends.

"He was a hard work- John Atkinson er. He was just kind and caring. He would give the neighbours the shirt off his back."

What's more, Mr. Atkinson was the type of man who was devoted to his family, which

included three sisters and two brothers. He also kept in touch with his 87-year-old father every day.

"My dad was the type of guy who got up at 5 a.m. He called his dad every morning at 6 a.m."

While he wasn't an outwardly religious man, Ms. Kaufman says he had firm Christian beliefs.

"He wasn't a religious man but he believed in God. Everyone knew where his heart was," she says. "Everyone has a time and my Daddy's time had come."

The visitation for Mr. Atkinson was held Sunday at Walas Funeral Home, 70 Church St., Warkworth.

A funeral service was held at the Presbyterian Church in Warkworth.
