'Flash' Gordon's jersey comes home

A piece of local hockey history was brought back home to the Grafton arena recently.

Amongst a gathering of family, friends and Grafton sports figures from days past and present, Harvey Gordon's 1945 Grafton Men's Team hockey jersey — the first he was ever given and wore proudly—was presented by the Gordon family on June 21.

Called up to the men's team at the age of 15, Harvey 'Flash' Gordon was given the number 8 to wear, and he never let it go. When he left home, the sweater went with him. It was kept in boxes; trunks and drawers for 62 years. Made of 100per-cent wool, it remains in remarkably good condition.

About one year ago Mr. Gordon brought the jersey out of storage and offered it to son Garry and his girlfriend Jan Menzies to add to their rec room display of nostalgic items handed down from family of days gone by. Garry and Jan encased the jersey in a shadow box and up on the wall it went in their Camborne home.

They soon realized this was a true piece of local hockey history, and the only proper place for this sweater would be — should be — the Grafton arena, where it could be displayed for all hockey players and fans, young and old, to enjoy.

Long-time Grafton sports figure Dick Raymond was contacted, and soon the jersey was on its way to being included in the arena's collection of local sports memorabilia.

Also in attendance at the presentation was Clarke Harnden, life-long friend of Harvey Gordon and the only other surviving member of the 1945 team. It was he who astutely brought to everyone's attention the fact that a team photo from 1938 currently hangs in the arena lobby, in which team members sweaters that look exactly like this one.

Mr. Harnden recalled with enthusiasm being present when the photo was taken in 1938. He was only seven years old at the time and,

'although not visible in the photo, was standing just off to the side when the picture was taken. A mere seven years later (at age 14 and alongside his 15-year-old buddy Harvey Gordon), both would don the sweaters and join the team.

More than six decades later, these two life-long friends, a jersey and a photo have come full-circle the 1945 sweater and 1938 photo will hang proudly together in the arena auditorium.

Summer nature day camp openings for kids available

At a time when society is focusing on environmental issues, Lower Trent Conservation offers what it believes is a special opportunity for young people through its annual day camp program.

Nature camps operate on a weekly basis Monday through Friday starting June 30 until Aug. 22 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily at the Goodrich-Loomis Conservation Area north of Brighton.

The area offers a spacious, airconditioned information centre for shelter and indoor activities plus a scenic stream and many acres of various habitat.

Some weeks offer special themes such as climate change, species at risk and other

environmental issues.

One of the most popular is the annual Enviro-trek week, July 14-18, and Aug. 11-15, which includes trips to the Ganaraska Forest and the Peterborough Zoo.

Cost is \$85 per child per week (\$105 for Enviro-trek weeks) and special family rates for three or more children. Extended hours care is also available from 8-9 a.m. and 4-5 p.m. for an additional fee of \$25 per week.
