## Layoff of 85 elementary teachers erased at public school board

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All of the part-time and full-time teachers scheduled to be laid off this fall will be staying in the classrooms.

The Kawartha Pine Ridge District School Board announced Monday that the 85 elementary school teachers who were on the "redundant list" in May now have places within the board.

"We're very pleased . . . We were able to place everyone," said Judy Malfara, communications officer and school liaison with the public board.

The board had announced 40 full-time and 45 parttime teachers had received layoff notices for the coming school year due to declining enrollment of close to 1,000 students.

But Ms. Malfara said all of the teachers are able to stay on due to the number of retirements,

resignations and requests for changes in assignments.

"Just this week we were able to get the final few on the list into positions," Ms. Malfara said.

She noted the school board's associate director of education, Sherry Summersides, has been working throughout the summer to reduce the number of layoffs.

Six secondary school teachers were also to be laid off but found positions.

Ms. Malfara noted the budget approved in June gave the school board more indication on what needed to be done this fall.

"We have to be prepared in any eventuality," Ms. Malfara said, explaining the board needed to make decisions before all of the numbers were in to prepare for the next school term.

"This new is really good for everyone," Ms. Malfara said.
