A co-defendant, who cannot be named under the Youth Criminal Justice Act, is also charged with second-degree murder.

Mr. McNeely, of Peterborough, requested the delay in order to review the disclosure for the case that he has only recently received.

Northumberland OPP officers did the right thing when they shot and killed 14 of his cattle Wednesday morning after the animals were found wandering close to Highway 401 traffic.

"We can't risk a life," he said, acknowledging the damage that could be done to the passengers of a vehicle involved in a collision with a cow.

Mr. Wright said he had moved the cattle to a friend's property located near Highway 401, but he believes a bear kept scaring them and they would wander off into the deep brush and end up along the highway.

Because the cattle were spooked, he said, "you couldn't get close to them.

"(Northumberland ' officers) needed to do what they did."

Mr. Wright cut a hole in the fence and removed the dead cattle using a tractor.

Building stalls in September

Building has slowed in Cramahe Township.

Figures released by Cramahe's Chief Building Official Natalie Moroz-Cornell show only one home was started last month.

The total for the month was only \$307,000 and, without the Penny Lane home, it would have been only \$57,000. The total marked a slight drop from August when building totalled \$365,000.

On a year-to-year basis, there' have been nine fewer homes built in the first nine months of 2008 than in 2007 when 26 were erected.

The only redeeming factor this

year is the industrial expansion in the industrial park which has pushed this year's building total to \$12,652,900, almost double the \$6.8-million of a year ago.

Every month for the rest of the year, Cramahe will be adding to its record which has topped the previous high set in 2005.

It will not reach the total of 146 permits issued and 59 homes started that year. There have only been 79 permits issued in the first nine months of 2008. The township is currently on track to complete about two homes a month.

Last year, the township was experiencing a building surge in the residential sector, with building topping \$1-million in four out of five months leading to October.
