Colborne artist wins Governor General's Award for 'Bella's Tree'

E COLBORNE – Modern fairy-tale 'Bella's Tree' has led to a fairy-tale scenario for its Colborne illustrator, who was recently awarded a Governor General's Award for her work.

"When I first read the story I thought,
'Oh no, what have I gotten myself
into?" said Jirina Marton, an artist and
illustrator based in Colborne, explaining the repetitive nature of the story
worried her.

"I thought, 'How many different ways can you show someone cutting down a tree?', but then the more I read it the more I thought there was something special there."

After accepting a Governor General's Award for Illustrated Children's Literature during a ceremony in Ottawa on Nov. 26, Ms. Marton now concedes that those worries were unfounded and calls the intricate illustrations a suc-

cess. Despite that success however, she remains humble about the accolade.

"It's nice to have your work acknowledged," Ms. Marton said. "But the most important thing is how you live and spend your life. For me I take the feeling that maybe you helped someone through your pictures or your work."

Bella's Tree tells the tale of a child's search for the perfect Christmas tree to please her grandmother. With the help of some friendly birds and the family dog, Bella is successful on her fourth try.

"You can't repeat exactly what's in the story because that would be boring," Ms. Marton explained of her methods. "You have to bring so much more to the illustrations so you bring readers to another world."

Originally from Prague, Ms. Marton moved to Paris after attending art school and eventually settled in Canada. She moved to Colborne from Toronto four years ago and says she

would never go back to city life.

"I would not change even if someone paid me to go to Toronto," she laughed.



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PRISONER HURT

Inmate assaulted at Warkworth Institution

WARKWORTH – Warkworth Institution was on lockdown late last week as a search of a prison unit for items that may jeopardize the safety and security of the institution wass conducted.

At 9:33 p.m. Dec. 29, a Warkworth Institution inmate approached staff. It was discovered the man had been assaulted by another inmate.

Correctional Officers applied first aid and the inmate was taken to Campbellford Hospital by ambulance. He was treated for injuries and returned to the institution the same night. Upon return, he was placed in segregation.

Police were notified. No instigator has been identified at this time, a prison statement Wednesday afternoon said. An internal investigation will be conducted.

In the interest of the safety and security of the Institution, the Acting Warden Angie Legacy ordered the lockdown. Visits had been suspended, but were to resume Dec. 31.
