The joint U.S.-Canadian citizen (who lives and writes in Toronto) is the author of seven books, including the novels Catalogue Raisonne and The Syllabus. He also wrote the short-fiction collection, Contrary Angel, and the poetry collections, Calm Jazz Sea and a thaw foretold. His short-fiction collection, Aquarium, won the Danuta Gleed Award.

In his book, The Lily Pond, Barnes chronicled his 30-plus years of coping with the destructiveness of an illness that infiltrates thinking, feeling and acting in ways that change the very fabric of identity. The book also detailed the psyche's resources in healing and reknitting that fabric.
