

## FAMILY CLAIMS BIOSOLIDS CAUSED HEALTH ISSUES

WARKWORTH - After suffering declining health allegedly following the use of sludge on neighbouring farmers fields, former Warkworth resident Wendy Deavitt is fighting back.

"I feel it's time for us to be compensated for

what we've suffered," Ms. Deavitt explained, listing a wealth of health conditions such as chronic fatigue, swollen glands, coughing and sore throat, that she and her family suffered while living at their former residence, a Warkworth hobby farm.

Her animals, including horses, cats and dogs, also suffered from health complications that allegedly began after a neighbouring farmer began spreading biosolid sludge on his fields in 2007.

Ms. Deavitt and her family have since relocated to a rented home in Campbellford after their farm failed to sell during two years on the market. It has since been turned over to the lender and is listed as a power of sale
