

VICTORY: Cobourg man's suggestion will become reality

Highway of Heroes coin coming in 2011: Mint

COBOURG — The Royal Canadian Mint has agreed to issue a collectors' coin in 2011 that was suggested by Northumberland Today reporter-photographer Pete Fisher.

The Mint announced Wednesday that a Highway of Heroes coin will be issued, as Fisher had proposed in August 2009.

"I think it's absolutely amazing. I am ecstatic about it," Fisher said Thursday in an interview.

Following a tour of the Mint last year, he brought forth his idea of commemorating not just the soldiers who give their lives in Afghanistan, but the Highway of Heroes on which they take their repatriation journey - Highway 401 between Trenton and Toronto.

Specifically, he wanted to honour the everyday citizens who show up on overpasses every time, in every kind of weather, to pay their personal respects by their presence, their salutes, their waving of flags in tribute to the sacrifices that have been made on their behalf.

Following a positive initial

reaction, the idea was formally declined Nov. 4 of this year. But Fisher thought the idea was too important to aban-

He was heartened by the grassroots support of the community for his idea, but he

said that he couldn't have turned things around without the efforts of his friend Carolyn McIntosh of Mississauga. McIntosh

online petition that almost has 2,000 names by now, but she did even more. She contacted municipalities and organizations like the Toronto Fire Department -(after which their association

came on board).

Another person Fisher said he couldn't have done it without was Trent Hills Mayor Hector MacMillan, the first mayor to endorse the idea. The Trent Hills motion was disseminated coast to coast through the Association of Municipalities of Ontario and the Federation of Canadian Municipalities.

It gained the support of the Northumberland-Quinte West

MP Rick Norlock and MPP Lou Rinaldi, but the final pieces clicked into place this week.

A meeting had been slated for mid-day Wednesday between the head of the Canadian Mint and the mayors of the three Northumberland municipalities that had endorsed the creation of the coin — MacMillan, Port Hope Mayor Linda Thompson and Cobourg Mayor Gil Brocanier.

The night before, Hamilton Township council voted its endorsement. Wednesday morning, Northumberland County council endorsed it.

The Mint meeting ended up being a conference call with all the county's mayors sitting

The specifics of the coin and its release — date, denomination, design - have not yet been decided, Fisher said, but the biggest hurdle is over.

"This was done for all the right reasons — for the soldiers, for their families and for the people on the bridges," he said.

The press release from the Mint promises a status report to county council within four or five months.
