Cramahe Mayor points to progress

CRAMAHE TOWNSHIP -Mayor Marc Coombs addressed a crowd of Cramahe businesspeople at a breakfast meeting on March 30, telling them how the township has grown in the past few years. Speaking at the township's annual business awards presentation Coombs pointed to the growth of the township industrial park as a pivotal development.

In 2007 the township purchased 45 acres south of Highway 401. Since then, HD Supply has opened a large distribution centre and Real Flex is in the process of purchasing land.

Growth in economic development has led a change in the responsibilities of the township's economic development officer Rebecca Goddard-Sarria. Goddard-Sarria now spends 75% of her time on the development portfolio and 10% on tourism.

The mayor advised the business audience that the first leg of the \$6-million waste water expansion project is nearly finished and expected to be completed in the summer.
