Warkworth pumping Station costs climb JOHN CAMPBELL INPERIORNI MUCH truer picture of where it's going

TRENT HILLS - Taxpayers might be called upon to help foot the bill for a new pumping station in Warkworth that could cost much more than originally estimated.

A staff report presented to council last week identified the cost of providing hydro service to the pumping station is now estimated at \$150,000. The cost of the building and pumps has also escalated as the design moves closer to being finalized, director of planning Jim Peters warned council in his report submitted July 5.

Under a funding formula previously approved by council, the developer behind the Orchard Hill condominiums currently under construction contributed \$125,000 to the pumping station, leaving an estimated balance of \$325,000 to be funded through water rates, water lot levies and other income generated by the Trent Hills water system.

"However, as the main reason to undertake the project is fire protection for the entire village, it is recommended that a portion of this project be funded through the general levy," Mr. Peters wrote.

CAO Mike Rutter sought to allay council's concerns over the mounting cost of the project, saying staff will be able to provide "a much truer picture of where it's going" when council meets again later this month.

The issue was brought to the attention of members now because "we didn't want council to be caught off-guard," he said.

Councillors Kim MacNeil and Gene Brahaney expressed frustration with how slowly the project is proceeding and how much more it appears destined to cost. Coun. Brahaney said he was "shocked" by the cost of the hydro service.

"These numbers are ridiculous," Mayor Hector Macmillan said. "It's so far out of whack it's got to be an error."

Mr. Rutter assured council "that number is significantly higher than it's actually going to come in at ... We weren't trying to alarm you but we did want you to be aware that things were changing."

Mr. Peters stated in his report that "it is still hoped that at the tender stage the cost will be reduced."

He said "the increased costs reflect a general trend with infrastructure projects."

Mr. Rutter said afterward the municipality had proceeded with the assumption that water users would pay for the new pumping station but further consideration led to the realization that maintaining proper pressure is critical to fire protection, which is funded with tax dollars.
