## Cramahe Township honours businesses

For the first time ever, two companies were honoured in the same year as the top businesses in Cramahe Township.

The awards were presented during the Cramahe Community Development annual "meet and greet" breakfast last week at the Keeler Centre.

"One's a global company with millions of dollars in sales, the other one is from here," said Mayor Marc Coombs when he announced the winners. "One has thousands of shareholders throughout the world and the other one is from here. But both are strong contributors to our local business community and

our community at large."

Named as 2011 Business of the Year were Holcim (Canada) Inc., a fixture of community support in Cramahe Township for more than 50 years, and Custom Trailer Manufacturing, which, last year, undertook their biggest expansion ever in their 20-year history to meet the demand and increase in business for retrofitted dump trailers.

Municipal council has been proactive Coombs told those who attended the early morning meeting.

your obstacles and resolve those."

A strategy session in January evaluated the current use of facilities, including the Voreen Buff Jack Memorial Centre, Castleton Town Hall and Keeler Centre, with an eye to increase opportunities for youth and seniors programming. A new business and retention study was launched last fall. As well, a new wastewater treatment plant will be completed by the fall.

"That will allow us to have unfettered growth in the Village of Colborne," said Mayor Coombs. "It's important we set up for growth in the community and this will allow us to do that."

A real success story for the municipality is the industrial park at Purdy Road in Colborne.

"There's all kinds of interest in our industrial park," said Coombs. "There are companies looking at coming into Ontario and looking for access to Montreal and Toronto along the [Highway] 401 corridor and, of course, land prices are better this side of Toronto than the other side of Toronto."

Another plus for the business community was when a Tim Hortons shop moved into the area.

"Somebody told me once Tim Hortons comes in you're going to get all kinds of activity," said Coombs. "And it's true. We've been

getting all kinds of inquiries about the land around there."
