CRAMAHE TOWNSHIP — When all proposals to maintain Cramahe Township's website came in over \$20,000, council balked. Now, I-Compass, the company that currently provides website management for agendas and other municipal record-tracking, will be approached to handle other website information at a cost of \$7,356 the first year, \$2,500 in Year 2. The proposal also includes training, implementation and support and most importantly allows for unlimited users to update and alter website information, Dan O'Brien, Cramahe director of operations, reported to council June 5.

The same company handles similar requirements for other Ontario municipalities.

Council unanimously approved the new website service June 5.

HOUSING Three-lot development proceeds in Castleton

CASTLETON — A three-lot residential development will go ahead in Castleton. Cramahe Township council approved the plan on June 5.

A year ago, council gave provisional consent to Ray and Jennifer Taggett to sever three lots south of County Road 22 at 115 Gould Rd. Because the lots are in the eastern edge of the Oak Ridges Moraine, an environmental impact study was required. That has been done and the Lower Trent Conservation authority has consented to the development as long as it meets all municipal and Planning Act stipulations. Cramahe Township council and the Taggetts will now sign off on the development agreement.
