## Habitat anticipates first Colborne home

COLBORNE - A group of Cramahe Township councillors and staff joined Habitat For Humanity Northumberland staff and volunteers this week to view the Baldwin Street lot in Colborne where the first Habitat home in the municipality will be built next year.

"The first step is finding a Cramahe family, but the build is scheduled for 2013. We're hoping for early in 2013, but really what will impact that is when we can identify a family and also some fundraising elements," Habitat executive director Meaghan Macdonald said.

People manager Laurie Carrol has already held a local information session and will plan others, Macdonald added.

"And we have also approached local service agencies and given them our application forms."

While Colborne families have applied to become Habitat families in the past, the land has not been available. Then, earlier this year, council passed a resolution to donate this lot.

'We have been working with the municipality for a while to try to identify a lot. when they MORTHUM BERLAND

came to us with this one, we were so excited - we know there are families in this community who can benefit from home ownership," Macdonald

She agreed with Mayor Marc Coombs that this location — at the corner of Ontario and Baldwin streets in the Colborne Creek subdivision would make a wonderful home for a low-income family, with family programming at the nearby Keeler Centre, walking trails to the Rotary Centennial Park playground and easy walking distance to shopping.

"We want a family in place before we start to build. And depending on the schedule, it is likely this might end up being our 40th home," Macdonald said - quite an accomplishment, she noted, for an organization that will celebrate its 15th year next year.

"Council is really excited about this project," Coombs said.


"We have been looking at doing something like this for a number of years. We are so glad to get it started.
