Cramahe facing doctor shortage West and committee co-chair Randy Oliver say their group, funded by four West Northumberland municipalities, has a successful recruitment model. This year three doctors in this area have retired and another has left. They have been replaced by a pair of doctors who have picked up the 2,300 people on their patient

> West is proud of the committee's success, claiming a high retention rate, but warned this is just the first wave or retirees. More than 30% of Northumberland doctors are over 60. Nine are expected to retire, stranding as many as 13,000 patients. There is

expected to be a doctor shortage in the province until 2017.

New doctors demand a work / life balance and often do not take as large patient loads.

One of the recruitment committee's goals is to sustain primary health care. Oliver encouraged Cramahe to develop its own plan. Its situation is more difficult than some, as both its practising doctors work alone, even though they are in health teams.

If Cramahe were to support the recruitment committee, its share of the costs would be \$7,000. Council will consider the request when it discusses its 2014 budget next spring.
