



In the latest in a string of multivehicle collisions this winter which have shut down Canada's busiest highway, eight tractor trailers col-

Davidson said there was lots of black ice on the highway at the time of the collision after snow squalls earlier in the night.

Some of the rigs jackknifed, oth-

ers went over the embankment. In some cases the cabs were ripped off of their frames.

A one-metre section of the cement median was punched out into the westbound lanes when one of the tractor trailers struck the
