OPP recover stolen property valued at \$500,000

NORTHUMBERLAND -- A treasure trove of stolen goods valued at half a million dollars was recovered in an investigation with Northumberland OPP.

Since February of this year, the local OPP street response team, in conjunction with the Brockville Police Service, have been investigating thefts dating from 2003 to 2014 in Cobourg, Stirling, Rawdon, Peterborough County, Haliburton County, Centre Hastings, Brock-

ville, York Region, Toronto and Northumberland throughout County.

To date they have recovered \$500,000 worth of property, including farm equipment, a truck, a motorcycle, excavator and cargo trailers, said Northumberland OPP Constable Steve Bates.

Four people are facing charges but Const. Bates would not confirm if the suspects were working together in a type of crime ring.

"They were known to each

other," said Const. Bates.

The matter is going before the courts and police can not reveal more detail about the investigation, he added.

Joao Rosario Silva Do, 49, of Centre Hastings has been charged with six counts of theft over \$5,000, possession of burglary tools, five counts of possession of property obtained by crime, five counts of remove/ destroy/alter a vehicle identification number, and four counts of trafficking in property obtained by crime.

Darrin Taylor, 43, of Brighton has been charged with three counts of possession of property obtained by crime - over \$5,000.

Jeff Turney, 40, and Jamie Martorino, 34, both from Township, have Cramahe been charged with theft over \$5,000.

Rosario Silva Do and Taylor will appear at Cobourg provincial court on June 25, while Turney and Martorino will appear before in court in Brockville.
