## Grafton landscape artist smashes her way into studio tour

## Northumberland Hills tour Sept. 13 and 14

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GRAFTON -- Anja Hertle is a borderline hoarder, but don't expect to see her on any TV show seeking help.

As a full-time mosaic artist, Ms. Hertle's home studio is chock-full of boxes, buckets and bins of broken mugs, plates and basically anything that has the capacity to be smashed into tiny pieces.

"People are nervous to give me a cup of coffee in a really nice coffee mug," she laughed. "I love the mug for what it's meant to be used for too, I don't break everything."

Her work ranges from detailed landscapes made from colourful shards of glass glued to a wooden canvas, to portraits of animals and pieces depicting vibrant scenes of nature.

A collection of her work will be on display for the upcoming Northumberland Hills Studio Tour, which runs from Sept. 13 to 14.

The tour provides art lovers a chance to tour artists' studios across Northumberland.

This marks the fourth year Ms. Hertle's work will be on display in that showcase.

With a number of other galleries in the area also showcasing her work, she's on her way to becoming one of Northumberland's go-to mosaic artists.

"I find little bags and boxes of broken things on my steps," she said.

Her career in the arts dates back to when she studied interior design at Ryerson University, but always had a thirst for creating fine art.

She didn't land in the mosaic medium until she found a course teaching the subject. "I took a course on how to do this and I've been hooked ever since," she said.

Originally, Ms. Hertle used tile to create her pieces.

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As the years crawled by, trends started to change, specifically within interior decorating.

She soon discovered that the colourful and vibrant tiles that were once popular were no longer in mass production and becoming harder to find.

"Everyone's bathrooms are beige or brown now," she said. "It got harder and harder to find bright colours, and I love colours."

So she set out on a quest to replace tiles and figured she could make the most of colourful china and dinnerware that were also lush with texture and patterns.

"And they're three dimensional," she added. "That opened up a whole new idea of making the pieces three dimensional."

As a full-time mosaic artist, Ms. Hertle is constantly on the hunt for new material,

which often consumes her when's she out of the house.

Even when she's not shopping for art materials, she can't resist eyeing potential objects to take back home and smash to smithereens.

"I always keep my eyes open," she said.

"Even if I'm at Canadian Tire for something completely different."

These are the only awards that recognize accommodation destinations around the world that "leave visitors healthier when they check out than when they checked in," she states.


Winners will be selected by consumer vote, which is underway at Spafinder.com now through Sept.19. Winners will be announced at the World Travel Market in London on Nov.6.
