## Coombs, Van Egmond hang on in Cramahe





CRAMAHE TOWNSHIP -There were moments of held breath for the top two Cramahe Township council spots but in the end, at 10:45 p.m., Monday, incumbent Mayor Marc Coombs held on.

He defeated the challenger, incumbent Councillor Pat Westrope, by 166 votes. The final unofficial count was Coombs 1319, Westrope 1153.

And it wasn't until the last box of votes was counted that newcomer Sandra Arthur was declared deputy mayor-elect. In a three-way race, the vote results were: Arthur 894, incumbent Jim Williams 857 and Lee Dekeyser, a former mayor, with 717.


Two of three councillors are new. Incumbent Ed Van Egmond, who led easily all evening, garnered 1,479 votes. Next came newcomer Don Clark with 1,202

votes and Tim Gilligan, a former councilor defeated in the 2010 election, regaining his seat with 1,178 votes. Incumbent councilor Clinton Breau was edged out with 999 votes, followed by Murray McCullough 530 and Ken Awender 454.
