CRAMAHE TOWNSHIP -There are staff changes afoot in Cramahe Township.

Incumbent director of operations Dan O'Brien will be the new chief administrative officer (CAO) effective the end of June.

"Dan brings with him a strong background in operations, facilities and management and has the benefit of working for the past six years as part of our senior management team. This will serve us well going forward," Mayor Marc Coombs states in a press release issued shortly after 9 a.m. April 21.

"We have an incredible team of employees in place to service our community and I am

O'Brien said Tuesday he has not signed a contract with the Township but will receive a salary increase to reflect his promotion.

Born in Peterborough, O'Brien attended the University of Western Ontario for three years, married and began work in Toronto. His credentials are " all experience-driven" he said Tuesday evening. He was on the board of governors for Exhibition Place for 22 years which included major events planning, staff co-ordination, contract negotiations and risk management. Two weeks ago, deputy clerk Candace Doiron announced she is leaving effective May 4 to take up the same post in the Municipality of Trent Hills.


On April 10, Cramahe posted a job vacancy for a new position, that of clerk, which recommends an Association of

REPORT: System 'in good operating condition' overall, council hears

Colborne water system facing some upgrades

COLBORNE — Some water mains in Colborne will require replacement or rehabilitation in the coming years.

treatment and distribution with Lakefront Utility Services Inc. (LUSI), the company contracted to oversee Colborne's water sys-

tem, said in a report received by Cramahe Township council April

"Burnham Street is an undersized main based on its location in the distribution system. Because it is undersized, it cannot Craig Brooks, manager of water provide adequate fire flow to that Apple Drive watermain is under area and points downstream," Brooks said.

In addition, "King Street East is also undersized in the Parliament Street area and causes this same negative effect to areas to the east. Colton Street is also undersized and provides very little flow and inadequate fire protection to the area and residents it serves."

Iffy water pressure on a Big engineering review with hopes to reach a solution this year. When fixed, that main will provide a "reliable second feed" for the

water distribution system.

Water pressure for the system is maintained by a water tower on a hill on the north side of Highway 401. In 2014, there were several water system shutdowns when a Bell line connecting the tower to the water treatment plant was severed during reconstruction of Purdy Road. Other 2014 water system alarms were caused by power outage or chemical feed pumps becoming gas locked.

Overall, the Colborne municipal water system "is in good operating condition and will continue to provide good quality drinking water" to customer for the foreseeable future, Brooks said.

All regulation standards and test results are readily meeting met. In fact, the Colborne water system is using only 24% of its approved capacity. The average

flow was down 11% in 2014 from the prior year — but the income from billing is still below what is actually being metered. That has lead to LUSI suggesting an audit of all commercial, industrial and institutional customers be done.

In the distribution system, the hydrants were all flushed in the fall, with one hydrant being replaced. There was one water main break during 2014.
