It's ironic to have this problem, Smith acknowledged, given the coyote issue other areas are having. He has a friend with a permaculture farm who lost 50 chickens in one night.

Inspecting his garden, he sees that one spinach plant is now broken and will not make it. But he still hopes for a good crop not only for his own family, but because he strongly believes in donating fresh produce to Fare Share as a nutritious option in addition to the packaged foods they usually receive.

"It's so much better to have fresh lettuce and tomatoes," he said.

Smith understands the cats have to take care of themselves, too.

"But not in my garden," he declared.

In a letter to Cramahe Township council, Smith requested

Over several weeks of enquiries, Smith sees no such solution. His response from Council was that a cat bylaw would not solve the problem, and that his only choice was to trap the animals himself and transport them to the Shelter of Hope.

The shelter does provide some services to Cramahe. But since that township is not one of its four funding municipalities, they only do what they are contracted for, such as the pick-up of stray

Shelter manager Elizabeth McKinley said they would provide the same service for cats if there were an appropriate bylaw

and if that service were arranged by contract.

Trapping the cats himself presents the possibility of injury or exposure to disease, Smith said. And even if he successfully trapped them, he has a day job with its own commitments.

"I'm a pretty busy person and don't have time to be running trapped cats all over the county,"

he said.

"My biggest issue is, what if I were an elderly person? The animals are climbing all over my new vehicle, digging in my gardens and yowling all night.

"I'm sure my other neighbours are dealing with the pair of them as well."
