Process Theatre set for debut in downtown Colborne

COLBORNE - As if live theatre in Colborne does not sound exciting enough, the quality of the team behind it is certainly something to celebrate as they announce their first production - For Lease Navidad!, Nov. 27 through Dec. 13.

Michael Gellman has an extensive resume dating back to 1973, including work with Second City as an actor and director.

Deborah Smith earned a master's degree in classical theatre from the London Academy of Music and Dramatic Arts in England (along with Benedict Cumberbatch). She was the founder and first artistic director of the St. Lawrence Shakespeare Festival in Prescott, Ont., which is now entering its 12th year. She joined Gellman in Chicago to live and work in theatre.

Now, in a sort of bid at semi-retirement, they stand ready to open the Process Theatre in downtown Colborne at 15 King St. East.

The show is a an original comedy revue, written by the cast (Hallie Burt, Andrew Di Rosa, Adam Mc-Bride, Madison Kozdas and Smith) and directed by Gellman. All original music is written by music director Mitchell Cox of Castleton.

Smith sums up the revue-styled show as, "music, scenes, poetry, songs, comedy, satire and original stories based on local happenings.

"The show is fast, funny, thoughtful, satirical and smart," she said.

"If you have never seen a comedy revue, you are in for a treat. The actors play many, many dif-

ferent roles, sing, play music and make you laugh, all with original material."

"In 2016, we will be presenting Process Theatre is a brand new three summer shows from May to October, along with our summer

comedy revue and our Colborne Christmas comedy revue," Smith said.

"We are currently finalizing our 2016 summer season and the dates of the shows."

Along with developing their own shows, Smith said, the season will explore new work from Canada, the United Kingdom and the United States.

"We also intend to host international workshops and festivals in storytelling, improvisation and playwriting."

On Nov. 26, there will be a pay-what-you-can preview. Any amount is accepted at the door, as long as it is presented along with a non-perishable item for the local food bank.

Opening night is Nov. 27, with the show followed by a reception that will give you the chance to meet the cast and say hello.

Otherwise there are 7:30 p.m. shows Nov. 28, Dec. 3, Dec. 4, Dec. 5, Dec. 6, Dec. 10, Dec. 11 and Dec. 12, with a 2:30 p.m. matinee Dec. 6 and a 2 p.m. one Dec. 13.

The Nov. 28 show time may require adjustment, Smith noted, as they will begin after the Santa Claus Parade goes by.

Tickets are \$25 and, with a theatre capacity of only 38, Smith suggests you get yours early.
