NORTHUMBERLAND -- Police warn of the dangers of playing the new Pokémon game after an incident in Colborne.

Two red cars and four occupants were spotted driving erratically in the down-

town area of Colborne around 1:30 a.m. on July 13, Northumberland OPP said.

Police stopped the vehicles and spoke to the people who told police they were playing Pokemon GO.

No charges resulted but police will be enforcing distracted driv-

ing laws, he said.
