A 1.18-km stretch of Highway of Heroes adopted in honour of Grafton's Major Michelle Mendes

Major remembered Nov. 13

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GRAFTON -- Grafton's Major Michelle Mendes, who died in Afghanistan in 2009, now has a part of the Highway of Heroes in her name.

Maj. Mendes, 30, an intelligence officer, was found dead in her room at the Kandahar Airfield, on April 23, 2009. She was the 118th Canadian soldier - and first Northumberland born and raised - to die in the Middle East, since Canada become involved in the war in Afghanistan.

A sign now marks an 1.18-kilometre stretch of the Highway of Heroes at the Grafton exit in memory of Major Michelle Knight Mendes. The highway was adopted in her honour recently thanks to a fellow Canadian solider.

Former Master Corporal Collin Fitzgerald wanted to find a way to honour Maj. Mendes close to Grafton where she grew up, said Kerri Tadeu who was friends with Mendes for 10 years. Maj. Mendes' parents Ron and Dianne Knight live in the Grafton area.

Fitzgerald was awarded the Medal of Military Valour for aiding wounded comrades in a burning vehicle under enemy fire in 2006. He has since suffered from post-traumatic stress disorder. Tadeu and Fitzgerald developed a close brother-and-sister-type relationship after meeting, said Tadeu. Although he never met Mendes,

Fitzgerald feels a connection to her story.

"Michelle and I didn't know each other. It's in Michelle death that my life was saved," Fitzgerald said. "Kerri was witness to my suffering and my commitment to end my suffering and she reached out and made a commitment to me to help me to help myself and move from pain to purpose."

Fitzgerald heard through his friend Nick Kerr about the Adopt A Highway program and decided ed to pursue the honour for Mendes. The distance was chosen because she was the 118th Canadian soldier to die in Afghanistan.

Kerr, Fitzgerald and Tadeu plan to remember Mendes on Nov. 13 at 11 a.m. at the Lyle Street exit of Hwy. 401. They welcome the public to join them. They also plan to clean both sides of the Highway on that day.

Mendes was an accomplished soldier. She was earning a master's degree in conflict analysis and resolution at Ottawa's Carleton University in 2003. Her first tour in Afghanistan was also cut short. She was deployed as an intelligence officer in August 2006 ahead of Operation Medusa, a full-scale clash with the Taliban in Kandahar's Panjwaii district. Military officials said she was injured in an incident they would not disclose and was treated at Landstuhl military hospital in Germany before returning home.
