Small-scale solar panel projects proposed

CRAMAHE TWP. - Three small-scale solar panel projects are proposed for Cramahe Township on three five-acre leased parcels of land.

Simon Rowland, CEO of Renewable Power Partners Inc., asked Cramahe council to endorse his proposed projects

at council Nov. 1 and they did.

In 2009, the Ontario Government and the Ontario Power Association (OPA) introduced the Feed in Tariff (FIT) program to promote green energy production. Under this program, the OPA offers 20-year contracts for individuals and corporations to invest in solar, wind, or hydro power stations.

Under the original FIT program rules,

the applications were processed mainly on a "first come, first served" basis. However, under new draft rules for the FIT program, the OPA has changed the selection criteria to be based on "priority points." Applications which have the support of the municipality receive extra priority points.

On each five-acre site, the solar panels are designed to cover half the site to gen-

erate electricity. All will be have screening to limit visibility from nearby roads or from neighbouring buildings.

The first 500kW project would be on land owned by Mike Lamers on Dekeyser Road, the second 250 kW project on land owned by Ann and John Dillman, the third 500 kW project on land just north of the 401 owned by Ford and Cramahe Deputy mayor Sandra Arthur.
