Don MacFie, owner and operator produces about 140,000 board feet of lumber each year. The greater portion

A special bark-edge knotty white pine siding which the mill turns out has become very popular in the area and gives a rustic look to exteriors of buildings. Two students are employed at the mill full-time each summer. The mill has been established for 20 years.
