The Thompson Family.

Adam Thompson, born in Scotland in 1828. Janet Crawford born in 1832. They married and came to Canadam, with a baby daughter, Mrs Wilson, in 1857. They settled in Guelph, later went to "The Centre", in Eramosa Tp. Ason, Adam, was born in Guelph, the rest of the children in Eramosa:

Nellie, 1858 John, 1860 Jos., 1862 Wm., 1865 Richard, 1859

The family, except Mrs Wilson, moved to Muskoka, and settled on Crown Land in 1870. Mrs Wilson married and lived on the Wilson; She and her children spent summer holidays with their grandparents in Macaulay.

Mrs Thomson gave details of taheir early years in Macaulay. No milk or butter, mush for breakfast, plenty of maple syrup. Lots of wood cut by the boys.

Adam, the sm left Muskoka, worked for his keep, while attend/
ing Collegiate in Galt, went in and out on the C.P.R. Visited
the family from time to time. Mrs Thompson wrote to Mrs Wilson
in which she wrote of making Adam a pair of pants - it was her
first attempt and hoped for the best.

Adam taught school for a time, took a medical course and set up in Galt, after finishing off in Scotland.

John and Richard , while young, went West and died there in 1894. buried in Kildonan cemetry.

Mr Thomson was a tailor and fromhome to Bracebridge to work. He was an ardent member of the Prespyterian church. He was one of 20 who built the first Prespyterian church in Bracebridge. For years was presiding Elde Elder and Precentor. Mrs Thomson was always ready when called o on in sickness ,and when a new baby was expected in any of the families. A small black bag was her constant companion, always with sweets for the little folk; who truly believed that the new baby came in Mrs Thomson's bag.

Mr Thomson died in 1904, Mrs T. in

18 17 1906.

Will and Nellie moved to Town so me years after their parent's death. Joseph married the school teacher of S.S. No. I, Miss Mitchell. He was an Accountant and died while in the prime of life. His wife lived for a few year later.

Nelliie lives till 1933, Will died in 1944, or about.

The Thompson farm was sold after Will's deat and is owned by Frank Brown of Guelph. He said he found gold on his place. this was authenticated by an assayer.
