The Rev. S. M. Craymer took his text from St. John: IV; 27. The theme was our Lord's attitude toward women as directly opposed to the old Jewish opinion that women were necessary only for housekeeping, child bearing, etc. and were of no more importance than a house, a servant or an ox. That woman was man's inferior, not as clever nor as valuable to God. Jesus was the first to proclaim the value of women as equal to that of man because God made them equal to man.

Right here it is of interest and highly instructive to recall that Jesus' first miracle in Cana of Galilee was preformed quite at his mother's wish when she said, "They have no wine," and that when he was suffering the agonies of crucification he told his disciple, John, to look after his Mother.

Mr. Craymer stressed the submission of the Virgin Mary and the great love that led her to the foot of the cross. We love and honour the Mother of Jesus, but we do not worship her. It seems well on Mothers' Day to remember that men and women together take their own and proper share of the work in the family of God for the kingdom of God which is a Kingdom of Love.

During the service the choir rendered the Anthem "Sayiour Breathe An Evening Blessing". Mrs. E. A. Whitten was at the console of the organ.
