

Monetville Women To Help Furnish New Auditorium

Monetville, Jan. 20 -- At the regular January meeting of the North Star branch of the Women's Institute of Monetville, 26 members were present. The ladies are finding it easier to attend meetings, now that they are held in the new auditorium, which is not only more central, but more convenient for large groups, than the member's small homes.

A sum of \$25 was spent for plates, cups, etc., and lunch essentials for the school opening. Of the \$167.75 left on hand it was decided to send \$75 to the bank in Sturgeon Falls as a fund toward the furnishing of the Auditorium. Various other incidental expenses were to be paid from the cash kept on hand, including the membership fees for 30 members to be sent to the district treasurer, Mrs. T. C. Grieve and Miss Agnes Kennedy were appointed auditors.

Would Buy Flag
It was decided to purchase a dishpan and tea kettle to start equipment for the kitchen and home economics room. The committee on citizenship suggested the purchase of a Canadian flag for the school. A paper on "Citizenship and Education," prepared by Mrs. Marion Lawrence was read, also an inspiring letter from Mrs. J. R. Futcher, of St. Thomas, president of the Federated Women's Institutes of Ontario.

In her letter, Mrs. Futcher outlined the results of the annual meeting. Briefs, she said, were sent to the various departments on conservation, medical manpower and a better health survey, and dental care for remote areas. The slogan continues to be, "Higher Conception of Citizenship for All," to be reached by each member exercising her franchise, upholding the public good, setting an example and trying to break down racial discrimination, as well as study the problem of the increased use of liquor. An objective of 50,000 members has been set for the year 1950. The branch gaining the largest percentage of attendance and members wins the gavel. The second week in July was set as W.I. holiday week.

The North Stars has sent two more "sunshine boxes" on to Bert E mundson and the other to Mrs. Wm. Cartier. The meeting closed by singing "O Canada."

hostilities a fund was started for a memorial auditorium but when no suitable site could be settled on the club was disbanded. A plaque was secured bearing the names of all who served.

The organization meeting was attended by the W.I. organizer for Sudbury district, Mrs. H. Williams, of Garson, and Mrs. J. Hamilton, of Capreol. Mrs. Williams outlined the aims and objects of the institute.
