## FIRE IN TRUCK CUTS SUPPLIES IN MONETVILLE

(Special to The Sudbury Daily Star) Monetville, Jan. 12—Quite a bit of excitement was caused here by a wholesale grocers delivery truck from Sudbury when it arrived at Harold's Corner Store with its weekly delivery of groceries and merchandise.

The driver had only been in the store a moment, when Hubert Lawrence, Sr., a resident living just across the road from the store, came hurrying in to accost the astonished young man with the words: "Don't you know your truck's on fire?"

The driver rushed out to the van to be met at the door by a mass of flames and smoke. Anxious to save the merchandise the excited driver jumped into the van and began throwing out cartons of burning merchandise. Harold Fryer, owner of the store, appeared with a fire extinguisher. The driver, almost overcome by the smoke and heat, was forced to leave the van. Fryer was able to subdue the flames and would have put the fire out, but the fluid in the extinguisher ran out, having been depleted by a previous fire at the store. The fire was extinguished by carrying water from a nearby well. The two men had the excitement all to themselves.

The truck carried various merchandise for Harold's Corner Store, a delivery for the French Restaurant and others. Packages of melting lard, partly cooked broken eggs, cartons of smoldering cigarets and tobacco, baked potatoes in their jackets, nerve pills and brooms, etc., were scattered about. The driver gathered up the remains of the shipment and returned to Sudbury.

The unfortunate occurrence left Fryer's supplies greatly depleted and resulted in the community housewives being unable to get eggs, shortening, salt, etc. for their week-end cooking.

The fire is believed to have started from a heater, used in the back of the van to prevent perishable groceries from freezing.

### Mail Delivery Reduced

Monetville residents are finding it hard and exasperating to get adjusted to the winter mail delivery, as usual. From Christmas until June 1st, mail is delivered and out-going mail picked up three times a week, Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. From June 1 to Christmas, there is a daily mail service, but even then all the mail is a day late, as the mail bags are picked up in Rutter, on one day and taken to the post office in Monetville, and the mail is not delivered to the people east and north of Monetville, until the next day. The residents are getting restless over the problem, especially as the bulk of the mail all comes this way. A move will soon be made asking a daily delivery the year round.
