Monetville School Closed By 'Flu; Many Stricken

Monetville, March 1 — The flu virus has found its way into this community at last. Wednesday morning the senior pupils arrived at school to find a notice on the door saying their teacher, Clifford Robinson, was ill and classes would not be resumed until Monday.

Frances Purcell who attends the high school at Sturgeon Falls is at home ill. Teentown was cancelled Thursday night as only Miss Muriel Woodard was able to take charge, Mrs. June Lang, the other chaperone being down with flu, as well as Robinson.

Mrs. James Mercer, Fred Richer and Paul Hunsburger have been stricken with what is presumed to be flu. Nancy Thompson and Shirley Richer are reported to have mumps. Several of the children are

dropping out of class. Miss Woodard reports classes starting Thursday morning with 17 in the junior room, and ending with seven from last recess until 4 p.m. None of the cases are serious as reported.

Dr. George Vachon and Mrs. Vachon, of Noelville, visited the school Wednesday afternoon giving the pupils, and pre-school children their last whooping cough serum. Mrs. Vachon and Mrs. Jack Dunn assisted the doctor in preparing the children. A larger injection was given this time and some reported sore arms the next day. One or two felt sick, but the timely administering of the serum has saved all but a small percentage of the susceptible children from severe coughing, the usual strangling, sick stomachs and nose-bleeds.
