Bill McDonald, who was also master of ceremonies, sang the beloved carol O Holy Night and read a poem written by the late Mabel Curtis. Thelma Ennis, a senior-citizen guest, recited the The Taming Of Eli Hopkins and Diane Brett, president of the Women's Institute, welcomed the guests, as did Lillian Huggard, vice-president of the Legion, while Reeve Rein Vandewal of Loughborough Township extended a civic welcome.
