Highway 17 Improvement Asked by WI

DESBARATS - The Women's Institutes located throughout Northern Ontario are petitioning the provincial government to stabilize Ontario Hospital Service insurance premiums, provide a hospital school for retarded children in northern Ontario and remove a traffic hazard near Copper Cliff.

The resolutions were passed by delegates of institutes from Sudbury to Sault Ste. Marie, 30 miles west of here, at a twoday annual meeting.

The women asked the government to improve the Trans-Canada Highway west of Copper Cliff because a number of persons have been killed in traffic accidents during fog.

Noting the recent increase in hospital insurance premiums, the women resolved to ask the government to avoid further increases.

Calling for accommodation in the north for retarded children, the delegates said children from this part of the province now are assigned to a hospital school at Smith's Falls in eastern Ontario, an institution built for 2,000 that has 2,700 children now and a waiting list of 400.
