Notes re Lot # 20, Horton Township

David Price was the son of the late Charles Price of Combermere, Ont., who with his brother came out from Ireland in the early 1800's. Employed as a labourer he came to Horton and married Mary Ann Finan. They farmed from 1858, first with Mary Ann's father and later settled on Lot # 20, bordering the 6th. line of Horton. and the Portage road.

To-day the property is vacated and only shrubs remain where the home had been. The family of 10 boys and 5 girls attended S.S.# 4. School on the Portage Road, and St., Barnabas Anglican Church one of the first Anglican churches in the County.

Mrs. Mary Ann Price was the organist of this church till her death.

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David and his sons were mainly lumberman and some of [^]boys were river drivers. Two sons met death by drowning on the drive.

The youngest son Herman operated the first broadcasting station in Saskatoon, Sask.

Mary Ann Price was quite talented and turned out beautiful handwork and wove cloth on her hand loom assisted by her daughters Susan and Elizabeth.

George

After the death of Mr. and Mrs. Price their [^]son and his wife Catherine Lewis lived on the small farm and in 1885 they moved to the Canadian west, settling in Saskatoon when there were only around 25 families there.

George sold the farm here to the late Wm. B. Eady who in turn left it to his daughter (Ethel) Mrs. Ben Church of Haleys. It was then sold
