From June 17-22, 1997, the city of Hamilton, Ontario, will be overflowing with guests from across Canada and around the world for a WI Centennial Celebration & FWIC Convention '97.

Two busloads of visitors from England are already booked to attend. Requests are coming from as far away as Australia to join in the celebration of the formation of the first Women's Institute in Stoney Creek in 1897.

Have you requested your registration forms for Convention '97 yet? The forms are now available from your provincial office. Early birds who register before October 31, 1996, will receive a reduced rate and are eligible for a special draw. The number of registration forms per province is limited by the FWIC quota system, which means that the forms for the full convention may not be photocopied.

The Convention '97 Committee has planned an exciting program which will ap-

peal to all. The first two theme speakers (to be announced when confirmed) will speak on "Indebted to the Past;" the last two will take a look into the next century discussing "Committed to the Future." Interspersed with speakers are Tweedsmuir Competition awards, historical displays, entertainment, an interfaith service and a roof top picnic. Also included in the program are information sessions on the work of the Women's Institutes in various provinces, the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada and the Associated Country Women of the World.

For those who are unable to attend the full Convention, special packages are available. Ontario Day will feature tours of the Adelaide Hoodless Homestead, the Erland Lee (Museum) Home and end with a barbecue and a birthday party. Celebration Day includes a fashion show, an historic pageant and an international dinner and program.
