The Ross Township fire chief said the biggest equipment concern is the lack of a rescue van. A new pumper to replace the 1958

truck at Forester's Falls is also a priority.

Training officer Dale Black pointed out that the Ross Township Fire Department responded to 31 incidences in 1991-- 16 were auto accidents on Highway 17.

"We provide 24 hour a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year service," said Officer Curtis. "I think that the Ross Township taxpayers should be very proud of the people in their fire department.

"The department has responded to everything from a plane crash in a lake to a chimney fire, a chemcal spill and auto extrications," said the Petawawa fire captain. "I

think they deserve a pat on theback."

Coun. Vic McLaughlin, who attended the Mutual Aid meeting, said it was most gratifying to see the amount of training being done by the fire department.

Coun. Don Rathwell added that over the years the Ross Township Fire Department in Forester's Falls and Haley has developed into a united group.

"The ratepayers of Ross Township are very fortunate to have this group of firefighters," said Coun. Rathwell. "All Ross Township should thank you."
