Queen's Line Ties Series At Three

The big come back

Deciding Game Thursday Night

There is a multitude of phrases that could be used to describe what has happened in the last two games of the UOVMSL championship series between Queen's Line and the Red Bargain Barn, but no matter what one uses it still boils down to the fact that Queen's Line mounted an incredible comeback drive to pull even with the Barn and force a seventh and deciding game in Forester's Falls.

One could point to the impeccably timed hitting spree of Ron Purcell, whose solo shot homer pounded well over the left field fence in game five, gave his team a life-saving 1-0 victory. And again in game six, going three for three at the plate he cranked one out of the park to score the first and game winning run in a

3-0 decision.

Or one could look to the superb pitching of Art Cameron, who has had the Barn batters swinging like gates in a windstorm, shutting down even the powerful bat of Don Lauzon, the man responsible for almost 80 per cent of the Barn's scoring in the first four games.

Yet while Purcell and Cameron stand out, it has also been an impressive team effort of refusing to give in or commit any errors and coming up with the sparkling defensive plays that have made all the difference in two very tight games.

On his way to victory in game five Cameron picked up nine strike outs while giving up two hits and three walks.

Lloyd Stewart came up with a better record in

taking the loss with 13 strike outs to his credit while giving up only two hits and one walk. As the only pitcher on the Barn roster, Stewart had been throwing extremely well through five tough games.

Queen's Line started off early in game six with Purcell's lead off home run in the second inning. Stewart then committed a costly error with two out and a man on second he took Wayne Tanguay's shot punched back to the mound and threw the ball well over the first baseman's head. That brought in a run and put Tanguay on second, to be brought in moments later when Gerry Hodgins biffed a double to a gap in centre field.

The Line kept the Barn at bay in the following frames with the help of some

spectacular defence, particularly in the seventh when right fielder Wayne Tanguay raced in and made a diving grab on Jerry Johnson's shallow popper. Center fielder Robert Wood put the game away making an almost duplicate grab on Brian O'Connor's shallow hit. The catch caught a startled Mike Ryan well off first and Wood was able to turn the double play easily.

Cameron fanned six while issuing two hits and three walks for win with Stewart getting four strike outs and giving up six hits and no walks.

Game seven, the deciding match, goes Thursday night in Forester's Falls starting at 8:30 p.m. Whatever the outcome fans can count on it being a thriller as the two teams put it on the line for all the marbles.
