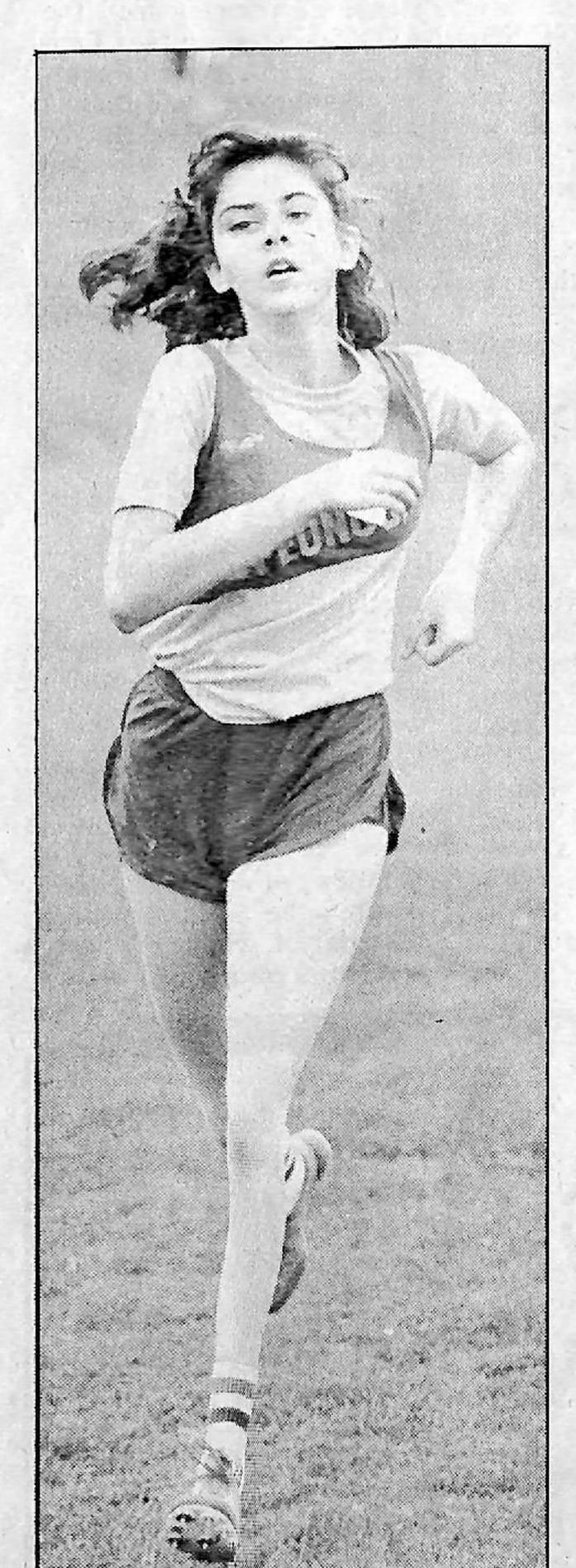

Opeongo High unbeatable



The Renfrew County High School Cross-Country Championships have been held for 16 years and Opeongo High School has won the title eight times... in a row.

A combination of excellent coaching and a seemingly never-ending abundance of skilled runners have been winning formula for the Opeongo program through the years and the school prevailed again on Friday afternoon at the Renfrew Golf and Country Club.

Coaches Dan Quinn and Tom May guided the team through a tough day of competition. In the end, OHS withstood a stern challenge from Deep River's Mackenzie High School to retain the championship 74 points to 70. Fellowes High School was a distant third and Champlain High School finished fourth.

Opeongo won three divisions as its junior and senior girls teams and the senior boys squad bested the field.

The senior boys have an exceptionally strong team, with five of its runners finishing in the top six rungs.

Running down the chute first was Terry Burwell and he was followed by teammates Wilf Kenny who crossed the line in second and Winston Caldwell who was home in third. Two notches down was Ted Wren who placed fifth and right behind him was Don Stewart in sixth. It was Stewart's first race of the season.

Earning a seventh place finish in the race was Madawaska's Chris Serran while Paul Breault of OHS wound up 12th.

The junior girls team also dominated the top 10 in their race. Shelley Burwell continued to run very well finishing second. Kelly McHale followed Burwell in third and Michelle Kenny was fifth.

MV was in the thick of the race with Rebecca Leonard placing sixth. Erin O'Neil of Opeongo hit the chute in seventh and Rachel Valiquette was 10th.

In running to a first-place finish in their division, the senior girls had a very satisfying day with Shelley Welk setting the pace in fourth place. Kathleen McHale wasn't too far behind in sixth while Cindy O'Malley was ninth, Charlene Haley, 10th and Tanya Dale, 14th.

Overall, the junior boys team was second, but individually Bernard Kenny ran to victory. Placing seventh was Kent Brown. Brian O'Malley was 10th, Paul Saunders, 15th and Dan English, 17th.

The Midget boys were involved in a close race and were slotted into the third position. Bill Laundry was the top OHS runner here hitting the line in fourth spot. Occupying the 11th position was Joe Kenny while Pat McIntyre was 13th, Joe O'Malley, 15th, Kevin Gutoskie of Madawaska, 16th and the Green and Gold's Gord Wren, 17th.

Starting the afternoon off was the Midget girls event and at its conclusion Opeongo stood fourth. Christian McNabb completed the course in sixth spot, Susan Enright, 15th, Stephanie Dick, 19th, Debbie Bielawski of MV, 21st, and Celeste Dumoulin of OHS, 25th.
