Sunday school in a log church which was later moved away.

In 1901 Jack, his brother George, Jim Low, Fred Ledsworth and Wes Smith all joined the Orange Lodge 278, Haley's, and went to the July 12th celebration at Eganville catching the train at Henderson's Junction. In 1907 Jack transferred his certificate to L.O.L. 480, Cobden, where he is still an active member.

Jack has seen many changes around the muskrat Lake since he first came to live beside it in 1906. In those winter days as he travelled with a team and sleigh down the lake to Cobden he might see another teamster with a load of wood going to Cobden or somebody taking home a sleigh load of ice for his ice-house. Today the people go by in cars on the snow-ploughed roads. As he watches out the window he sees fishermen coming up the lake by car, jeep, and ski-doo to the fish huts that are in little clusters here and there on the lake. On a Summer afternoon as he sits on the porch where he once listened to the sound of a wagon or buggy coming up the winding, tree-shaded road, he now looks down a wide, straight, black-topped road and watches the cars and trailers turning into a tent and trailer park a half mile or more away or perhaps some cottager driving past to his cottage along the Muskrat for the week-end. The lake itsself is a hum of activity with fishermen in motor boats, water skiers behind speed boats. There are many wells of drinking water in the district that he "switched" or devined.
