Pioneers usually chose land where water was available. A creek ran all the way through David Ross's farm, and livestock could drink there from any field on the farm. There was also abundant fish in the spring of the year, when they came out of Gibson's Lake to spawn.

David and Jane Evans Ross were blessed with a family of four sons and two daughters:

Thomas married Lydia Jardine and was a farmer.

James married Isabella Stewart and was a blacksmith in Cobden, and later in Weyburn, Saskatchewan. Their wedding certificate has come into the possession of a nephew, James Ross of Cobden, in 1977, having been on sale in an antique shop in Saskatchewan.

John was a storekeeper in Cobden and later worked for Customs in Winnipeg.

<u>Elizabeth</u> married Laughlin Curry who owned a sawmill in Foresters Falls.

<u>Mary married William Mason who farmed at Snake River and later on the edge of Renfrew.</u>

David Jr. met and married Janet Cook in 1894 while employed by a C. N. R. building crew at Goshen near Renfrew. He brought his bride by horse and buggy to the homestead of this history.

In 1872 Jane Evans Ross died in childbirth and was buried in Zion Line cemetery. The two daughters, Mary and Elizabeth, kept house for their father and helped to raise the younger children. David Sr, did not remarry.

When the oldest son Thomas wanted to take up farming, the farm
