## Things to see and do

COCHRANE RAILWAY AND PIONEER MUSEUM began to take shape in 1971 with the opening of a Ministry of Natural Resources interpretive car, and was expanded with the cooperation of the ONR and CNR by the addition of a steam locomotive, caboose, baggage car and coach. These house artifacts, picture collections, which maps, preserve memories of the pioneer and railway-building days, a small auditorium for class visits, and displays are representative of the James Bay Frontier. The museum train is "on track", east of the Union Station.

POPLAR PLYWOOD MILL of Normick Perron Inc. (Cochrane Division), largest of its kind in Canada, has recently expanded with the opening of a sawmill. Guided tours are offered—see page 22 for details.

BOTTLING PLANT of Fortier Beverages Limited. Guided tours of Northern Ontario's only Coca Cola bottling plant. Located at 158 Second Avenue. See page 20 for details.

MUSKEG TRAIL runs from the highway picnic area on Trans-Canada Highway at Buskegau River, nine miles west of Cochrane. Three-quarter-mile self-guiding walking trail develops two themes: the boreal forest, and a beaver community.

PUBLIC LIBRARYON Third
Street houses circulating and
reference sections, English and
French, and Len Hughes
Memorial Library of natural
history and wildlife.

BUS OR TAXI TOURS may be arranged, in the immediate area of the town, or farther afield.

PUBLIC UTILITIES PARK, on northern boundary, groups water treatment plant and deep wells, electric substation, sewage disposal plant. Cochrane is one of the few municipalities in Ontario owning its own telephone system.

BOUNDARY of the town, on the road leading from the Trans-Canada Highway to Drury Park is a plaque commemorating the founding of Cochrane. Four miles south on the highway a plaque marks the 49th parallel. (In the West this is the boundary between Canada and the United States!). Two miles west of the town on No. 11 a plaque marks the Niven survey line, cut 75 years ago through then uninhabited bush.

CANOE TRIPS -A reliable, experienced guide should be hired for all trips through the area from Highway 11 north to James and Hudson Bays. Only the most experienced canoeists should attempt travel in this isolated country where a mistake could cost a life. Canoeists with limited experience should choose a shorter trip in a less remote area. Many charter air services throughout Northern Ontario can provide float plane transportation, permitting travel on selected portions of routes.
